

Another Great Book Sale!

It was another great year for the FOHL Used Book Sale. With good weather, good crowds and over 60,000 books, we had a very profitable year, with almost \$44,000 in sales! After expenses, this translates into over \$32,000 that will go to support the Hockessin Library.

Every year we try to make our sale better than the previous year's sale. This year we concentrated on improving the shopping experience for those attending our Member's Opening Night Sale. For those who have not attended the Thursday night event, be advised that this is not a sedate wine and cheese evening where you leisurely browse the aisles. Most attendees are book dealers and book sellers (there is a distinction!) and competition for books can be fierce. This year we emphasized what practices were unacceptable, and we also beefed up security and the number of staff on the floor. These measures greatly improved the atmosphere of the evening and many longtime attendees commented on the improvement.

We would like to give a special thanks to the Scouts of Troop 50 and to Cameron Green, the scout who organized his troop's participation in the sale. The scouts and their leaders were of particular help Thursday night transporting boxes of books to the storage area and helping customers carry their purchases to their vehicles and on Sunday afternoon with the breakdown and cleanup after the sale. Thank you Troop 50! We could not have done it without you!

The FOHL Used Book Sale is totally a volunteer effort. With many of our longtime volunteers no longer being able to help, new volunteers are always needed for setup, staffing the sale, cleanup and year-round sorting of the books.

As I write this at the end of March, all library buildings are closed to the public to help stop the spread of the COVID-19 coronavirus among our community. Many of our services (programs, meeting rooms, and physical materials) are currently unavailable, and our book drops are closed.

But did you know that your library is still working for you? I’d like to introduce you to (or remind you of) some of our online only services, good for times like these, as well as once we reopen! See <https://nccde.org/2017/COVID-19> for details!

We continue to offer electronic books, audiobooks and videos through OverDrive and Libby. We’ve just added Hoopla, where you can get access to electronic books, graphic novels, audiobooks, music and videos. It’s even easier to use than OverDrive and Libby and offers simultaneous checkouts – no holds lists – on up to 4 checkouts a month per library card.

Don’t have a library card yet? No problem. Just go to <https://lib.de.us/help/librarycard/> and click on the link to sign up online for a library account (with a Delaware address). You can then use that library account to access our online materials until you can come in and upgrade your card to access our physical materials when we reopen.



Longtime Volunteer Larry Thurrell Honored by Friends Board

In February 2020, in recognition of his exemplary service to the Hockessin Library and the Board, and with the hope of his colleagues that he will

remain an advisor to their endeavors, the Friends of the Hockessin Library Board elected Larry Thurrell Board Member, Emeritus. In addition, the Library Reading Garden will be named the Lawrence A. Thurrell Reading Garden in his honor.

Larry's commitment to the Hockessin Library began in early 1990s at the time when the current library was planned and built. He was a book sale volunteer, hauling used books from donors' homes, and with other volunteers, sorting them and selling them for the benefit of the library at an annual sale. He agreed to chair the Book Sale Committee in 1997 and for 20 years oversaw raising more than \$500,000 for the Library. Though now retired from the chairmanship, Larry remains an essential member of the Committee.

Larry joined the Friends of the Hockessin Library Board in 1997 where he has been an advocate for community engagement on behalf of the Library and instrumental in raising funds for the Library addition and Reading Garden that were completed in 2008. He served as Board president in 2004-2005.

Larry's advocacy for community engagement is illustrated in part by the Reading Garden and support for high school seniors to pursue higher education. Larry chaired the Reading Garden Project from 2008 until 2017. Larry also chaired the FOHL Scholarship Committee in 2010 that funded scholarships to help Delaware high school seniors pursue higher education. Beyond his commitment to the Hockessin Library, his community service has extended to his volunteer work at the Center for the Creative Arts, the Red Clay Valley Association and the Friends of the Auburn Heights Preserve.

Larry's accomplishments are enhanced by his remarkable ability to recruit others to a cause and to keep them interested. The FOHL Book Sale is as large and successful as it is today because of his ability to recruit volunteers to do the myriad of tasks involved. Larry has also recruited dedicated FOHL Board members who have brought diverse perspectives and skills to the organization.

Get Ready for this Year's Summer Reading Challenge at Hockessin Library

This year's Summer Reading Program for Adults runs from June 1 - August 15, 2020. The theme for all age groups is "***Imagine Your Story.***" For the fourth year in a row all New Castle Libraries will be offering a coordinated program, using the Beanstack online platform. 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
